At our last Board of Directors' meeting, we shared how SSSS had

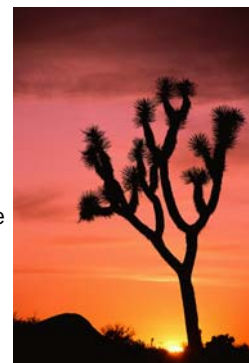

## FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



I never thought I'd be writing this column. Our Society has suffered

the loss of a former staff member, four Past Presidents and our President Elect all within the past seven months.

**Beth Brass**, wife of former SSSS staffer Richard Brass, died in May after a long battle with Cushing's disease. Beth was a certified sex therapist and served as an interim office manager for The Society. Both Beth and Richard were invaluable to me in the early days of my work with SSSS. Services for Beth were held in Windsor, CT on May 19<sup>th</sup>.

As you know, late last year, we lost our past president, **Drew Mattison** who valiantly battled cancer for several years. We have previously noted his passing. A delegation consisting of past presidents, Eli Coleman, Beverly Whipple, and Mike Ross along with SSSS members Olga Perez-Stable-Cox, Douglas Braun-Harvey, Charles Moser, Mary Bontorin, and Bill Balliet joined me at a beautiful memorial service for Drew on

February 18<sup>th</sup>.

**John Money**, internationally noted researcher from Johns Hopkins and a true "giant" in our field, died on July 7<sup>th</sup> following an extended illness. He died the day before his 85<sup>th</sup> birthday. Dr. Money served as President of our Society from 1972-1974 and received the Distinguished Scientific Achievement Award. He was also a Fellow. The Eastern Region of SSSS recognized his lifetime of achievements in the spring of 2003 by naming their award in his honor. A memorial service is planned for September 29<sup>th</sup> in Baltimore.

**Vern Bullough**, SSSS Past President, died on June 21<sup>st</sup> after a brief battle with cancer. Vern was our historian, archivist, mentor and friend. He was a prolific writer and researcher. A member of our Society for over 40 years, he served as President from 1981-1983. He was a Fellow and the recipient of the Kinsey Award and the Distinguished Scientific Achievement Award. Few in our field have enjoyed his excellent reputation as a preeminent researcher, educator and "expert" in so many diverse areas and disciplines.

He recently served on the program committee for our upcoming Annual Meeting and was active until the day he died writing and reviewing manuscripts at his desk until just hours before his death. A service of Celebration is planned for September 30<sup>th</sup> in Hollywood, CA.

**David McWhirter**, Past President of SSSS, and former partner of Drew Mattison, died unexpectedly in California on July 27<sup>th</sup>. David served SSSS as President from 1986-1987 and in various other capacities in the Western Region and The Society. He was a SSSS Fellow and served as Program Chair of the 2000 Annual Meeting in San Diego. David and Drew were best known for their internationally acclaimed work and book, "The Male Couple" (1984), which became the model for understanding gay male relationships. David and Drew, now both deceased, were together for 34 years. A service for David is planned for later this fall.

Lastly, and perhaps most shockingly, was the death of our President Elect, **Bob Hatfield**. Bob died unexpectedly of natural causes on July 19<sup>th</sup>

while working at his private practice in Maine. Bob was an active member of our Society and particularly the Mid-Continent Region where he served in various capacities until his recent move to New England. Bob chaired our Website Committee and was the force behind enhancing our website capabilities and our technological growth. He also served as "house photographer" for many of our meetings and events. Bob was eagerly preparing to become President of SSSS in November. Bob was a beloved educator (University of Cincinnati) where he taught classes to hundreds and worked as a therapist. He recently moved to New Hampshire with his wife, Deb, to work in private practice in nearby Maine. There were no services for Bob as per his wishes.

The board has unanimously approved the succession plan electing Pat Koch to fill the unexpired term of Bob Hatfield for an additional one year as president beginning November 2006 and Walter Bockting will remain on the board as immediate past president. Thanks to Pat and Walter for your willingness to continue serve our Society.

## AN INTERVIEW WITH JULIA HEIMAN, PHD, SSSS FELLOW

Dr. Julia Heiman has been the director of the Kinsey Institute at Indiana University for the last two years. She joined IU after 23 years at the University of Washington School of Medicine. As a graduate student pursuing child psychology, Dr. Heiman became interested in sex research while working with Dr. Jim Geer, a psychophysiological. At a time when sex research was receiving in-

creased attention, Dr. Heiman’s burgeoning interest in the psychophysiology of emotion developed into a career in sex research.

The Kinsey Institute’s legacy has returned to the public eye through the major motion picture *Kinsey* and a recent PBS documentary. Dr. Heiman says that the Kinsey Institute’s initial impact on society was Alfred Kinsey’s ability to incite discussion of American sexuality. Kinsey’s meticulous collection of 18,000 sex interviews, in

addition to his ability to make his books bestsellers, brought the nation’s attention to a then taboo subject. Importantly, Kinsey’s research was able to “get us to talk about and realize we didn’t know very much about sexuality. If we were going to take it seriously, we needed to do a lot more about it.” Dr. Heiman says that, still today, “The Kinsey Institute is a place where people can ask important and difficult questions, and try to get answers.”

Current areas of research interest at the Kinsey Institute involve research related to sexual health and developing new, effective methodologies to accurately measure sexual response. In the tradition of Alfred Kinsey, the Kinsey Institute is also still interested in national surveys of sexuality; however, Dr. Heiman reports that today it would be unaffordable to use the exact interview techniques of the original Kinsey study. “Kinsey’s methods were good for his time, for our time they are flawed.” In order to accommodate current challenges, computer-based methodology is being investigated. Dr. Heiman reports that the Kinsey Institute is currently analyzing data from a pilot study to determine the feasibility of this methodology.

Regarding funding for these studies, Dr. Heiman states

that initially Kinsey’s research was primarily funded through foundation grants. As sex research progressed, federal funding became more available. In terms of current funding, Dr. Heiman remarks that although funding is always a challenge, it is somewhat easier to gain federal funding for research involving sexual health. She reports that research in the area of developing new methodology is not well funded federally, creating the necessity of finding additional sources of research support. Due to the development and public acceptance of erectile dysfunction drugs, pharmaceutical companies have been increasingly willing to financially support research that fits their priorities. An area of future concern relates to the development and acceptability of pharmaceuticals for female sexual dysfunction. According to Dr. Heiman, this gender disparity in basic biological and social sexual knowledge remains prevalent in many of the areas of sexual research.

One area Dr. Heiman sees as important for funding lies in public acceptance of sexual research. This can be influenced by the media. She reports it is rare for the media to present a story on sex research that is not done in a provocative or suggestive manner. “How the media

portrays sexuality is important, because that is how sex research

gets into the public eye.” Additionally, Dr. Heiman observes that the way sex is politicized, and thereby conveyed to the public, creates a challenge to sex research. She believes that if the media helps portray sex research in a straightforward and factual manner that deals with compelling issues, congressional figures will hear more public support for funding.

Dr. Heiman asserts that it is important for researchers to consider public policy and their connection to it when conducting and reporting on their research: “To ignore public policy implications of sex research is a mistake.” Dr. Heiman emphasizes the importance of understanding what public policy says about sexual health, citing Dr. David Satcher’s Surgeon General Report as being particularly relevant. “People have certain rights and certain responsibilities to sexual health.”

In order to bridge the gap between researchers and the public policy makers, Dr. Heiman addresses the challenge in making sex research

accessible and understandable to those outside the field. "Researchers need to find a way to write their research findings in a language that

public policy makers can understand and make sense of for public health and welfare."

## THE JOHN MONEY COLLECTION AND SCHOLARS FUND AT KI

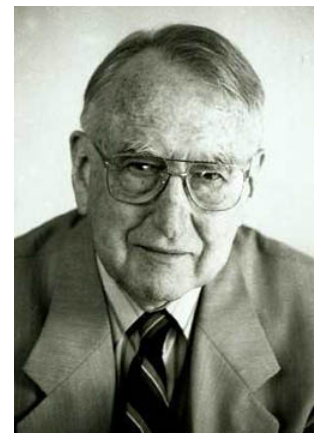
Among the collections at The Kinsey Institute library is the impressive archival collection of Dr. John Money, who passed away on July 7, 2006.

## IN THE NEWS

### Bush Casts his First Veto on Stem-Cell Bill

July 20 (CNN.com). President George W. Bush used his first veto to block legislation to expand embryonic stem-cell research, putting him at odds with top scientists and most Americans, including some in his own Republican Party. "It crosses a moral boundary that our decent society needs to respect so I vetoed it," Bush said. The U.S. Senate and House of Representatives had already approved the legislation. It returned to the House chamber but did

achieve the two-thirds majority needed to overturn the veto.

### Once-Daily Regimen for HIV/AIDS Approved by FDA

July 12 (nlm.nih.gov). The first complete, one-tablet-a-day medication using highly active antiretroviral therapy for HIV infection and AIDS has been approved by the FDA. The new tablet, *Atripla*, is a combination of *Sustiva*, *Truvada*, and *Viread*. The new pill will hold the lion's share of the market for new patients beginning HIV/AIDS therapy, and is expected to

improve compliance.

### Sildenafil Offers Little or No Benefit to Most with FSD

The Annals of Pharmacotherapy, 40(5), pp.931-934.

Studies regarding the safety and efficacy of sildenafil in the management of FSD were evaluated. Literature published between 1966 and April 2006 was accessed through MEDLINE, Iowa Drug Information Service, and EMBASE and bibliographies of pertinent articles. Many trials were of poor quality, making clinical application of their results difficult. The

current literature does not show Sildenafil to be an effective treatment option of FSD.

### Sexual Behavior linked to Music with Degrading Content

Pediatrics, 118(2), pp. 430-441. Results of a longitudinal national telephone survey indicated youth who listened to degrading sexual content at T2 were more likely to subsequently initiate intercourse and progress to more advanced levels of coital activity. Exposure to nondegrading sexual content was unrelated to changes in participants' sexual behavior.

## GRADUATE PROGRAM HIGHLIGHT

### WIDENER HUMAN SEXUALITY PROGRAM

The Human Sexuality Program at Widener University now has about 160 students enrolled in it various programs. Students have several degree options depending upon their needs, interests, and goals: M.Ed. in Human Sexuality; Ed.D. in Human Sexuality; MSW/Ed.D. in Human Sexuality; MSW/M.Ed. in Human Sexuality; Psy.D./M.Ed. in

Human Sexuality. Widener University is still the only fully accredited university to offer a doctoral degree program in human sexuality for both educators and therapists.

The program at Widener University has a very diverse faculty and student body. There are now 16 members of the faculty. Among our students, we are proud to have a good balance of male, female, gay, and straight

individuals, as well as religious, racial, ethnic, and cultural diversity. To offer an international presence, there are students from Mongolia, India, Israel, Liberia, and Canada.

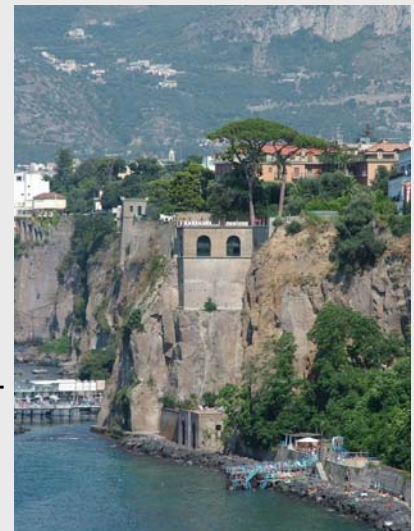
