From the President - Terry Humphreys

Dear Members,

I hope your summer months will be

productive ones, whether you are moving forward some research projects, writing a manuscript for publication, teaching summer courses, continuing your clinical practice, or the multitude of other sexuality related career activities that we do. I hope you make space for some downtime too.

The Society's Board of Directors and various subcommittees have been very busy with improvements to our organizational structure, outreach, and plans for upcoming annual conferences. Our Spring BOD meeting (April 2016) was held in Chicago in conjunction with the Society for Sex Therapy and Research (SSTAR) meeting. Three successful ventures came out of our Spring meeting:

- (1) The George Washington University Symposium. The latest successful SSSS one day symposium on "The intersection of health, gender and sexuality: A multidisciplinary symposium" was a collaboration between George Washington University and SSSS member Stephen Forssell. This event was co-hosted by Mark Schoen and Michael Vigorito.
- (2) **Bylaw changes.** As part of ongoing improvements to the efficiency and success of the Society, additional bylaws changes were proposed by the BOD and overwhelmingly approved by the voting membership. This change lengthens the terms of the President and President-elect to two years, removes the Past-President from the EC and BOD, but retains the Past-President

as the nominations committee chair for two years, and elevates the Membership Chair to an elected position on the EC. The student involvement chair on the BOD also changes from a one-year to two-year term. The main impetus for this change has been the routine complaint of SSSS Presidents that they only truly understand all the "inner workings" of the Society by the time their one-year term is finished. Providing an additional year will help Presidents think about and implement larger projects and actually see them through to completion. This will also provide President-Elect's another year to become more familiar with all of the moving parts of the organization before they take on the role of President. It was thought that a sixyear stint (i.e., if the President-elect, President, and Past President all had two year terms) was potentially too daunting to volunteers who might want to run for President, but could not commit to six years in office. For that reason, the Past President's role was reduced. The Membership Chair was added to the EC to keep a productive number of people on the EC and because the Membership Chair plays a key role in the organization with both financial and overall health implications - worthy of a seat on the EC. The EC and BOD conducted their due diligence prior to proposing these changes by exploring a number of possible configurations and then examining other organizations with the proposed structure to ensure it functioned well. Although bylaws are typically very bureaucratic and boring, we believe this particular change will provide Presidents with the opportunity to be

more visionary and less like a "caretaker" when they assume their responsibilities.

(3) 60th Anniversary Planning. It is hard to believe that our Society will be celebrating its 60 th anniversary in 2017! It is time, once again, to come together and celebrate the 60 years of blood, sweat, and tears that have led to the sexual liberties we have today and the struggles that lie ahead. The program co-chairs for our 2017 annual conference have been selected: Carlos Rodriguez-Diaz, Robin Milhausen, Kristen Jozkowski, and Justin Lehmiller. And the venue is...wait for it... Puerto Rico!! What better place than Puerto Rico to celebrate 60 years of sexuality progress, to rejuvenate our sexual energy, and to reinvigorate for the next 60 years! You are going to want to put this one in your calendar now! Come join us!

In the near future, our plans for the 2016 annual conference in Phoenix Arizona are in place and we are looking forward to another great conference in the sun! The lineup is very exciting, including plenaries on technology (Nicole Prause), sexuality education (J. Mase III), Viagra, Sexual Behavior, and HIV Prevention (David Malebranche), and a panel examining sexual science and its relationship with the media (Marty Klein, Pepper Schwartz, Laurie Betito, and Zhana Vrangalova)! But wait, there's more! Two plenary talks related to awards include Anthony Bogaert (Reiss Award) and Cynthia Graham (Distinguished Scientific Achievement Award)! In addition, we are infusing more research oriented, skill-based sessions into the conference. Look for these in the upcoming program. I hope to see you in Phoenix!

Thinking about Switching to R? Need a **R**efresher? Join Dr. Sakaluk at SSS!

This Year there is a New Statistics Workshop being Offered at the SSSS Annual Meeting Pre-Conference!

Are you interested in learning R? Do you need to brush up on the current best practices for different statistical analyses used during scale development and validation? Have you been craving a learning environment that is both comprehensive and accessible? There's now a SSSS workshop for that.

I am very pleased to announce that for the first time—at least in the decade I've been attending SSSS—there will be a statistics workshop offered during the annual meeting preconference. I will be instructing the 3-hour workshop, during which we will cover analyses used for scale development and validation, including: exploratory factor analysis,

confirmatory factor analysis, structural equation modeling, and brief introductions to latent class analysis and item response theory models.

During the workshop, I will instruct attendees how to use R to carry out these analyses. Despite R's almost unlimited analytic capability, its amazing price tag (free), and being Mac and Windows compatible, social scientists are sometimes hesitant to explore R as an SPSS alternative because of its syntax-based nature. The workshop will therefore also include a very accessible introduction to the bare necessities of using R. I will also be supplying attendees with tons of accessible exemplar code—most of the commands we will use for analyses will only take up a line or two of text!

Of course, you cannot learn everything there is to know about these types of analyses in 3 hours. Nevertheless, attendees can expect to leave the workshop with a better understanding of: (1) the foundations of these analyses; (2) the code to run these analyses on their own data in R; (3) how to interpret and report the resulting output; and (4) additional accessible and comprehensive resources to further learning of analyses for scale development and validation.

So if you are a faculty member or a student who is interested in finally taking the R plunge, and learning some of the finer points of latent variable analysis, consider joining us (with some of your own data, preferably) at the Latent Variable Analyses in R Made Easy pre-conference workshop.

This is a reflection of much hard work by the team of Associate Editors for the journal and the quality research that we aim to publish." The cited half-life index is again >10, illustrating the longevity of the articles published in JSR.



A Review of Treating Out of Control Sexual Behavior By Douglas Braun-Harvey and Michael A. Vigorito

Occasionally a book comes along that truly inspires me to change the way I work. This has been the case with Treating Out of Control Sexual Behavior: Rethinking Sex Addiction. Over the last decade or so, the specter of 'sex addiction' has cast a pall, not only over our field, but also over the larger culture. As a relationship and sex therapist, I began receiving alarmed and desperate calls from couples in distress.

Eli Coleman (2003) and David Ley (2012) helped greatly in illuminating how the designation of 'sex addiction' was a loose cluster of 'symptoms' and behaviors that were primarily culturally, morally, and even economically driven—completely without nosology, precision, or science of any kind. Although I was relieved and heartened by their contributions, I continued to struggle to find sex positive and applicable treatment approaches to assist clients who were truly suffering. Braun-Harvey and Vigorito have brilliantly provided just that: a user friendly, kind, coherent, and practical approach – one that is both grounded in science and data, and that is effective.

Braun-Harvey is no stranger to longtime SSSS members. I remember his presentation at one of our conferences, possibly a decade ago, when he presented equally ground-breaking findings about treating sexual issues. His ideas stuck in my mind, because they were radical, evidence based, kind, and they worked. He has done it again, this time with his co-author Vigorito, with whom he demonstrates a seamless collaboration.

Beginning with six absolute principles: Consent, Nonexploitation, Protection from HIV/STI's and unintended pregnancy, Honesty, Shared values, and Mutual pleasure; the individual or couple is encouraged to define his/her/their own vision of sexual health. Based in attachment theory and the dual process model of human behavior, the authors lay out a framework for clients to understand their own sexual conflict. Using a combination of group, individual and couple's therapy, the authors show a sex positive, spacious, and hopeful path through and out of this conflict.

The book can be used as a treatment manual and is also clear enough to be helpful to an intelligent lay-person. Although space limitations prevent me from saying more. I can't recommend this book highly enough. Doug and Michael will be featured at the AASECT Summer Institute this August in Saint Louis; their presentation is sure to be inspiring!

An Interview with Jean Levitan - 2015 Distinguished Service to SSSS Award Winner!

I recently had the opportunity to virtually "sit down" with Jean – an important mainstay at all the annual meetings I've attended – and asked her a few questions about her history with SSSS and what The Society means to her.

Jean, when did you join SSSS?

I became involved with SSSS in the late 1970's. I was encouraged to attend meetings by my graduate school mentor- Dr. Deryck Calderwood. At that time New York University was unique in offering graduate degrees in Human Sexuality, Marriage, and Family Life Education.

I have clear memories of hearing Albert Ellis, Wardell Pomeroy, and John Money talk at a SSSS meeting in a NYC hotel. The 1970's were a fantastic time for studying sexuality, with so much being published and openly studied.



You were recognized for your distinguished service to the society in 2015, why is working with SSSS important to you?

SSSS has always been my professional home. While meetings allow me to be a better educator by learning from all the research presented, getting involved with the organization and people is what makes coming to meetings so memorable. I benefitted years ago from the older regional structure within the Society, which had a strong presence in the New York/Pennsylvania area. I feel I "worked my way up" from committee work to various positions of leadership. Being a regional representative to the Board of Directors and then returning years later as the Regional President helped me understand the challenges of running a volunteer, non-profit organization. Eventually I held various national positions as well.

In life, people bring different talents to the table. A commitment to service has always been part of who I am—both for SSSS and William Paterson University as well. The Society has had the benefit of a most dedicated Executive Director in Mandy Peters, but it is the continued commitment of volunteers for committee work and in positions of leadership that insure the viability of the organization. Apart from the need for and fulfillment that comes from volunteering, is the benefit of growing relationships with colleagues from diverse geography that develop by becoming involved.

Do you have a favourite memory from SSSS, perhaps from an annual meeting that you would share?

Since I've attended regional and national meetings for close to 40 years, selecting a favorite memory is so difficult if not impossible. I remember being so impacted by Sandra Bem as she challenged the audience to think about sexuality in more fluid rather than distinct categories. I think of how respected researchers took serious issue with each other's work, and finding that what I first learned in graduate school in the 1970's was wrong. There used to be a morning plenary panel with a review of the past year in research, education, and therapy; I could count on that to cover the bases of "what I should know." And then the fun of good exhibits, seeing people, exploring new cities, and some wonderful FSSS events.

You've seen and know a lot about SSSS history, where do you hope to see the Society go in the future?

I naively thought for years that if important sex research was going on, SSSS would present it at a meeting. Our meetings attempt to do that, but we compete with other organizations. I see more growth in the field but often with more directed focus—HIV/AIDS, Reproductive Rights, LGBTQ and other identities, etc. The good news is that sex research is going on in many disciplines and appears on the programs of other professional groups. That said, I remain frustrated that funding is limited, and researchers have to carefully select where and to whom they present their work.

Organizations are competing for resources and talent. I continue to hope that SSSS brings new disciplines into the membership and that we remain the principal group for highlighting the latest and best research in the field. As someone committed to service, I also hope that younger members will find the time to carry out the responsibilities of their paid positions, including research, but also recognize the value of providing service to the organization.
