In Memoriam: Joani Blank

Joani Blank died August 6, 2016 surrounded by family in her Oakland home, opting to take advantage of California's recently enacted aid-indying law to orchestrate the timing of her death. She was 79.

Honest communication and interpersonal connection were the cornerstones of Joani's life. She founded Good Vibrations in San Francisco's Mission District in 1977, hoping to appeal to women who would otherwise shy away from adult shops by creating a no-nonsense, clean environment for sex toys and sex education. She also invented the butterfly vibrator.

Blank also founded Down There Press in 1975; a publisher focused on feminist and sex-positive works. Joani also wrote numerous books (including a ""Playbook for Women About Sex") and served as a volunteer for San Francisco Sexual Information — staffing the phones and answering questions for those who called in.

Joani Blank sold Good Vibrations in 1992 but remained actively involved with the company until her death. She is survived by her daughter and three grandchildren.

SSSS Pre-Con Session! SAR - Sexual Attitude Reassessment and Restructuring Nov 16/17

This unique "Sexual Attitude Reassessment and Restructuring" program or "SAR" is designed and led by two seasoned sexologists and long-time SSSS members, Dr. Patti Britton and Dr. Robert Dunlap, who have created a highly effective intensive to achieve a blend of traditional and contemporary SAR.

"SAR" is a highly provocative, experiential, cognitive and affective experience, which is designed to push comfort levels, elicit feelings and confront attitudes, beliefs and values about sexuality. Topics will be revealed at the course itself; the element of surprise and the psychological state of non-expectation form part of the basis for this pre-con. [No nudity or touch is ever required of participants.]

Small group process drives the understanding and impact of the elements in "SAR". It is not a clinical training in sex therapy nor is it traditional sex education: rather it enables the participant to move emotionally, intellectually, spiritually and psychologically into a zone of greater knowing,

acceptance, and tolerance of human sexuality in all of its possible dimensions. This SAR will help you to create better self **knowledge** and ability to **create** a safe space in which to work with clients, students and others while paving the way toward accepting our true sexual selves.

A participant of the SAR will earn 10 CE credits. SSSS is an approved sponsor with AASECT, APA, and NCHEC.



In Memoriam: Howard Ruppel

Dr. Howard Ruppel, PhD, died on September 9, 2016, of health related complications. He was 75.

Howard is survived by his wife of 49 years, Barbara, and two of his beloved cats, Maggie and Aurora.

Dr. Ruppel was an expert in the field of human sexuality. Over the course of his career he maintained his private sex therapy practice, the Center for Sexual Growth and Development. He taught Human Sexuality courses for 25 years as an Adjunct Professor in the School of Social Work at the University of lowa. In 1988, Howie became the Executive Director of the Society for the Scientific Study of Sex (SSSS) and in 1996 added the American Association of Sex Educators. Counselors and Therapists (AASECT). In 2001, he moved to the San Francisco area to become Chancellor and Academic Dean at the Institute for Advanced Study of Human Sexuality.


In 2008 Howard decided to partly retire in Mount Vernon. He enjoyed his interesting life and will be greatly missed.

We Asked - You Answered! 2016 Membership Survey Results!

Note that these results are based on the feedback provided in the 143 survey responses we received.



55% of respondents said that they'd like to see a future SSSS meeting held in an international location – in particular there was quite a lot of interest in <u>Canada</u>. These members will be pleased to hear that there has already been much discussion on the current SSSS BOD about holding the annual meeting in Canada in the near future!

59% of respondents said that they had attended at least one SSSS annual meeting in the past 3 years. Of these, 30% had attended the meeting in San Diego, 31% in Omaha, and 40% went to Albuquerque last year.

57% said that cost was an important consideration for deciding to attend a meeting. With this in mind, SSSS has strived to keep costs low and benefits high!

Call for Data!

Friends, academics, colleagues, lend me your ears! Actually, keep your ears; it is your data on **self-esteem and sexuality** that I'd like. Together, with Dr. Emily Impett and James Kim (from the Relationship and Well-Being Lab at the University of Toronto Mississauga), we are working on a meta-analysis of the association between global self-esteem and sexuality variables. That's a pretty broad net, so to give you a better idea of the data we're interested in, here are some examples of sexuality variables included, thus far, in our meta-analysis:

- Safe-sex variables (e.g., attitudes, behaviours, beliefs, experiences with STIs and unintended pregnancy)
- Permissiveness variables (e.g., sexual desire, # of sexual partners for various sexual activities, sociosexual orientation)
- Sexual function variables (e.g., problem with sexual arousal/pain/orgasm, ratings of sexual satisfaction)
- Sexual communication variables (e.g., condom negotiation, communication self-efficacy)
- Consent-related variables (e.g., experiences with nonconsensual sex, sexual abuse)
- Developmental sexuality variables (e.g., age of first intercourse, first sexual partner's age)

If you have unpublished datasets—or papers that we have missed in our lit review process—containing variables like these, and global self-esteem, **please contact us: sexuality.selfesteem.meta@gmail.com**

To make things a little easier: you can view our meta-analysis's reference list here. If you know you have papers with relevant data, have a look (search for your name) and if you don't see your articles listed, shoot us an email (we may have missed them, or may need more information from you to include them) and we'll be happy to include them (and cite them!!). And if you have unpublished data that seems relevant, we would be thrilled to include those too, and either cite a paper of yours hailing from the same sample, or profusely thank you in our acknowledgements (if no such other paper exists).


A Quick Guide to the Cass Theory of Lesbian & Gay Identity


SSSS Members at the New View Capstone Conference in Bloomington, IN
