"A SYMPOSIUM IN THE SOUTH TO GENERATE STRATEGIES"

SSSS Symposium at The Center of Excellence for Sexual Health in the Satcher Health Leadership Institute at Morehouse School of Medicine – By Dr. Carey Roth Bayer

On Friday, April 28, 2017 in Atlanta, Georgia, SSSS co-lead "Innovative Strategies to Address Sexual Health Disparities." This symposium was a first in several ways – it was the first SSSS event to be held at a Historically Black College and University (HBCU) school, Morehouse School of Medicine; it was the first to intentionally focus on bridging SSSS leadership, academia, community-based



organizations, students, and diverse racial & ethnic groups; it was the first to offer HIV/STD testing on-site during the event; and, most importantly, it was the first to include components that engaged the audiences in generating strategies to address various sexual health disparities. The symposium team leaders included: Dr. Carey Roth Bayer, Daniel Driffin, Dr. Angelica Geter, Dr. Natalie Hernandez, and Allyson Belton from Morehouse School of Medicine, and, Mandy Peters, and Dawn Olewnik from the Society for the Scientific Study of Sexuality.


The event started with a morning poster session where Outstanding Student Poster Award went to **Renee Roy** for *The Role of Trauma-Informed Care in Sexual Health for High-Risk Sex Work Populations*, and Drs. **Christopher Fisher**, **Jay Irwin**, **Jason**

Coleman, Sofia Jawed-Wessel, & **Aja Kneip Pelster** won Best Overall Poster for Sexual Literacy: A Research-Based Ecological Approach to Improving Sexual Health.

The opening plenary by Dr. Shelley Francis and Emily Halden Brown highlighted collective impact and community coalition models led by the Georgia Campaign for Power and Potential as well as the Atlanta Coalition for LGBTQ+ Youth. In the first strategic workshop sessions, Drs. Angelica Geter and Kristen Mark dove deeper into domestic sex trafficking, violence, and prevention while Daniel Driffin led rich dialogue on HIV and prevention strategies. Participants generated and recorded strategies for addressing the various disparities related to sex trafficking as well as HIV. Dr. David Satcher reflected on his years in



leadership, especially as the 16th Surgeon General responsible for the release of the Call to Action to Promote Sexual Health and Responsible Sexual Behavior (2001), and shared advice for the next generations of sexual health leaders in an interview-style session led by Dr. Carey Roth Bayer. Language meanings, culture, faith, and family traditions arose as key areas for sexual health conversation during a dynamic panel discussion on various cultural lenses and sexual health -- thanks to **Charles Stephens**, Dr. **Natalie Hernandez**, Dr. **Terry Humphreys**, and Dr. **Swagata Banik**. In the second strategic workshop sessions, Dr. **Jay Irwin** and **Amir Jones** led interactive conversations on transgender health & policy while Dr. **Eric Buhi** and **Natalie Elliott** focused on healthy relationships and





As strategies were generated and recorded throughout the sessions, they were posted for the 60+ participants to view. The closing session ended with summaries of strategies generated throughout the event with ideas for new partnerships and collaborations. An entertaining Cocktails & Conversations networking reception with Impulse Group Atlanta, raised awareness of the sexual health messages and approaches unique to black, same-gender loving men in the metro-Atlanta area. Partners for the event included the Transdisciplinary Collaborative Center for Informing Health Policy and Practice; The Fulton-DeKalb

Hospital Authority; Circle of Friends; and Impulse Group Atlanta.

Innovation, idea generation, and leadership continued on Saturday, April 29, 2017 as Morehouse School of Medicine's Center of Excellence for Sexual Health hosted the SSSS Board Meeting. These events proved successful for highlighting work on underserved and underrepresented populations in sexual health.







In Memoriam – Sandra S. Cole

Sandra S. Cole passed away peacefully on May 15, 2017 in Westminster, Colorado at 79 years of age.

Sandra was a professor and certified sexologist who worked in academic medicine for 40 years at the University of Minnesota and the University of Michigan Medical Schools. She is recognized as a pioneer in the transgender community, and in the field of human sexuality and disability. Dr. Cole was dedicated to issues of social justice, policy and human rights.

In 1970, Sandra joined the faculty at the University of Minnesota Medical School's Program in Human Sexuality. In 1990 Sandra earned her PhD in Advanced Study of Human Sexuality from the San Francisco Institute. In 1993 Dr. Sandra Cole co-authored the Ann Arbor, Michigan ordinance on gender identity non-discrimination, which passed in 1999. She founded the Comprehensive Gender Services Program at the University of Michigan, a pioneering multidisciplinary healthcare program for transgender people, and served as the program's director until her retirement in 2000.

Sandra was an AASECT Certified sexuality educator and counselor, and an elected Fellow of the Society for the Scientific Study of Sexuality. She mentored multiple professionals, many of whom have gone on to become experts and leaders in these fields.

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8 TIPS FOR GETTING PUBLISHED IN JSR - FROM AN INTERVIEW WITH CYNTHIA GRAHAM, EDITOR

Dr. Cynthia Graham is not only a professor of Sexual and Reproductive Health in the department of psychology at the University of Southampton in England; she is also the editor of The Journal of Sex Research (the journal of our Society).

Dr. Graham is very proud of the work she and her associate editors do for JSR (by the way JSR's impact factor is now 2.9!), as well as the stellar article submissions they receive from sexuality researchers all over the world!

I recently had the opportunity to chat with Dr. Graham and asked her if she could share some tips with us that will increase our chances of having a journal article accepted at JSR. She was very happy to share the following tips for authors who hope to have their work appear in the pages of a future issue of The Journal of Sex Research:

Tip #1 – Look at the journal carefully to see if your paper is a good fit – this applies when you are considering submitting to any journal. If you aren't sure, email your abstract to the editor and they will let you know if you should look elsewhere. JSR publishes on a broad range of topics, but it's still a good idea to check with Cynthia if you aren't sure about yours.

Tip #2 – Make your work's contribution to the literature very explicit. This is something that reviewers look for and can really sink a good paper's chances if it's missing.

Tell the reviewers why your work is special!

This is especially true if you are sending in a replication study or validation of a scale in another language. JSR cannot always spare space for these types of articles unless you can clearly show how your work is moving the field forward in important ways.

Tip #3 – Make sure your formatting is correct and that you've paid attention to the page limits (for JSR, most articles are around 35 pages long) Big cuts mean major revisions, which can lead to rejection.

Tip #4 – At JSR, preference is given to papers that show they have <u>practical</u> implications, especially implications for <u>policy and practice</u>. Be sure to highlight why and how your findings are important (and, if appropriate, how they relate to current political trends) when you submit!

Tip #5 – Acknowledge your work's <u>limitations</u> and make sure you are presenting a balanced view of the harm or benefits associated with the topic you're looking at (e.g., porn, sex work, etc.). Clearly biased work won't make the cut.

Tip #6 – Make sure you know the literature applicable to your work very well and that you've included references to the key studies on your topic. Your reviewers are selected from a pool of experts in the area and they are likely to

notice if you missed some important work (especially their own).

Tip #7 – Solicit feedback from anywhere you can. The more feedback you can get in advance, the more solid a paper you'll be able to submit and the better your chances will be. If too many of your reviewers recommend major revisions, this can result in rejection.

Tip #8 – Make sure that you set up the front end of your paper very

strongly. Your research questions need to be very clear and so does the logic for your research questions. Failing to set up your paper well can undermine your exciting results!

Cynthia and I hope these tips will help you highlight the best aspects of your work and put together strong papers that will improve your chances of it being accepted for publication! JSR has a high rejection rate, so you definitely want to send in your best work!



This was the fourth year **Dr. Kristen Mark** led her study abroad program in The Netherlands for students to engage in a cultural comparative study of sexuality, sexual health, and sex education. Her students benefitted from living with Dutch families in Amsterdam and traveling around to other parts of the Netherlands to learn about the Dutch approach to sexual health. **Dr. Karen Beale**, another SSSS member, joined Dr. Mark this year to collaborate on research examining religiosity and sexuality in the Dutch Bible Belt (yes, that exists!). Dr. Justin Lehmiller and **Dr. Shayna Skakoon-Sparling** also traveled to Amsterdam with a separate group of 12 graduate students from the US for two weeks for a study abroad course focused on sexuality and culture. The goal of this course was to enhance students' understanding of and appreciation for cross-cultural differences in sexual attitudes and behaviors. The main topics covered in the course were sex work, sex trafficking, sex education, and LGBTQ issues — comparing the USA, Canada, and the Netherlands. There was a strong Dutch cultural immersion component to the course as well, which included visits to several major museums and historic sites, bike tours of the city and country, and an amazing 5-hour food tour. Overall, it was an incredible, impactful, and extremely memorable experience that the students and their instructors will think back on fondly for years to come!

(Editor's Note: Both groups of SSSS members teaching/learning abroad in Amsterdam this Spring were also lucky enough to overlap for a few days and even had the opportunity to share a classroom session together!)



Thomas Landefeld had a book published last year titled: Sex: Understanding what you know, what you want to know and things that you have never even thought about. He was inspired to write the book to compliment his lectures on sex/reproduction in various classes, not as a textbook for the courses, but as an information base. In writing and marketing the book, it became obvious to him that much of the basic information is really not well understood not just by students (youth) but also by the general public. As such, he wanted to address sexual aspects associated with biology, sociology, demographics, etc. in his book for a wide audience. So far the response has been good!



ATTENDEES' REPERTOIRES EXPANDED AT THE GUELPH SSSS METHODOLOGY SYMPOSIUM!!

The SSSS Symposium has become an annual treat at the end of the Guelph Sex Conference and this year's program featured a set of enriching presentations that met this year's symposium theme quite well: Advancing Methodologies in Sexual Science. This program was co-chaired by Nathan Lachowsky and John Sakaluk, Terry Humphreys and Robin Milhausen served as the program committee.

Greta Bauer started the day with strategies for incorporating sex and gender diversity in sampling, measures, and analysis. Her work highlighted the fact that researchers must be careful what assumptions they are making about participants when they ask questions about sex and gender (e.g., are you assuming someone who indicated 'female' has a uterus and a



regular menstrual cycle, because this may not be true for all respondents who would pick this option) and demonstrated alternate methods to make sure that greater diversity is accurately captured and represented through our research techniques.



Tuuli Kukkonen followed with a presentation on the myriad of elements that go into setting up a psycho-physiology lab and using it to conduct sexuality research. This lively presentation was accompanied by a tour of Tuuli's lab so that attendees could see her set up for themselves!

After lunch **Sarah Flicker** told us about her community-based work with indigenous youth and their search for culturally appropriate HIV prevention methods. She spoke about the development of community-based approaches and, in particular, about her work assisting indigenous youth in the creation and sharing of digital stories as part of a public health intervention.

Amy Muise capped off the symposium day with a presentation on the importance and value of taking a dyadic approach to sex and relationship research. She also provided a survey of key methodological developments in the area of dyadic and longitudinal research. Amy gave attendees some insights from her own work and passed on some of the tips and tricks to make running dyadic and repeated measures studies a little less intimidating.
