Letter from the President of SSSS – Eric Walsh-Buhi



I hope you all are having a wonderful Autumn. I write you today with

an update on the actions of SSSS leadership regarding informal reports of sexual misconduct.

It has been almost three months since I first heard reports on social media, both directly and indirectly, about individuals who have experienced sexual misconduct (e.g., sexual harassment) while attending an SSSS-sanctioned event over the years. From what I've learned from both SSSS members and meeting attendees, no one is immune from experiencing sexual harassment. It should not be this way!

Sexual harassment is unacceptable, anywhere, including at SSSS events or annual meetings. These meetings should be safe and secure spaces for all. Harassment runs counter to our organizational mission. Our meetings should be welcoming environments, not hostile or uncomfortable.

My role as SSSS President is that of a volunteer. The other members of the Board of Directors (BOD) also serve in a volunteer capacity. As you might imagine, doing the business of SSSS takes time to be done well. However, each one of us was elected by you, the membership, to lead and serve. Everyone on the BOD takes this professional role very seriously.

Since late August, the BOD has had discussions about taking steps to ensure that SSSSsanctioned events are "sexual misconduct-free." Members of the BOD agree that sexual misconduct will not be tolerated.

Letter from the SSSS President continued...

To address sexual misconduct and harassment at meetings, we have initiated the following:

 Sexual Harassment Policy: The BOD has convened multiple phone and digital conversations centered on revising the current SSSS Sexual Harassment Policy.

2. Training of SSSS Leaders: The BOD will be participating in a bystander intervention training at its Spring meeting in Bloomington, Indiana. As organizational leaders, BOD members have a role in modeling appropriate behaviour and intervening when they witness inappropriate behaviour. It is not safe to assume, however, that everyone knows how to intervene effectively, and such a training is a first step in helping to develop critical skills and confidence.¹

3. Longer-term Organizational Solutions: To explore additional solutions, the BOD has named a new task force on sexual harassment. This task force, chaired by Zoe Peterson, SSSS Presidentelect, represents the diversity that is SSSS (i.e., it is comprised of women, men, sexual, gender, and racial/ethnic minorities, and members of varying tenure in SSSS). The task force has already begun discussions, having been charged to examine issues around harassment at SSSS events and meetings and make recommendations to the BOD regarding short and long-term solutions for making events and meetings positive, welcoming spaces, and to enhance the culture at SSSS.

4. Further Efforts to Understand the Problem:

The SSSS Membership Committee has developed and disseminated its survey of SSSS members, adding new questions about experience with harassment. Data from this membership survey will be extremely useful to SSSS leaders, allowing a clearer picture to unfold of how members have been impacted by sexual misconduct and harassment. Data will also be critical for informing efforts to address such behaviours at SSSS-sanctioned events.

5. Efforts to Protect SSSS Members and the Organization: Lastly, the SSSS Executive Director, Mandy Peters, and I have consulted with the attorney representing SSSS. As a private organization, SSSS is free to make decisions that protect its members and preserve the integrity and health/well-being of the organization. We learned that, in the end, the Executive Director and President have the authority to ask an individual to leave a meeting, if their behaviour runs counter to our organizational mission. We will not tolerate sexual misconduct and. accordingly, we will not hesitate to enforce this legal right. For now, the SSSS Executive Committee will help with this, perhaps with the assistance of an outside investigator, if needed.

You can also help: 1) <u>Just don't engage in these</u> <u>behaviours</u> and, if you witness such behaviours, 2) Intervene to stop it or 3) Report it to Mandy Peters or me.

Even with this progress, I ask for your patience as SSSS leaders continue to explore and enact solutions to ensure a safe space at all future SSSS functions.

I encourage you to contact Mandy Peters (mlpeters@sexscience.org) or me (ebuhi@sdsu.edu) with any thoughts, suggestions, or feedback you might have.

I'm looking forward to seeing you at the SSSS Annual Meeting in Montreal! SSSS is my home for learning about sex research, meeting and networking with new people, and connecting with existing friends and colleagues. I hope attending this meeting will reward you in the same way. Thank you.

^{1.} According to a systematic review of sexual violence prevention interventions (DeGue et al, 2014: www.sciencedirect.com/science/arti cle/pii/\$1359178914000536), the "majority of studies measuring knowledge, bystanding behavior or intentions or skills found consistently significant positive effects on these outcomes." Bystander intervention programs focus on individuals as potential witnesses to harassment or violence (rather than as perpetrators or victims) and provides them with skills to help when they see behaviour that puts others at risk, including supporting victims and intervening in potential situations.

In Memoriam – Dick Leitsch

Dick Leitsch, an early defender of gay rights, died this summer at a hospice centre in Manhattan, he was 83.


In 1966 bars were not allowed to serve alcohol to "homosexuals". Mr. Leitsch challenged the common practice of bars' serving gay customers under a no-questionsasked arrangement by holding a "sip-in" at a bar in Greenwich Village.

The bar had been serving a gay clientele since the 1950s. Dick and 3 friends stood at the bar in suits and neckties, a bartender set up glasses and asked, "What'll you have?"

"We are homosexuals," Mr. Leitsch announced, according to several accounts he gave to the news media. "We are orderly, we intend to remain orderly, and we are asking for service."

After the story was publicized in the press the liquor authority chairman, Hostetter, promptly denied that such a policy existed. This opened the door to challenge bars that denied service in court, which paved the way for licensed gay bars.

How Sex Got Screwed Up: The Ghosts that Haunt Our Sexual Pleasure

The ghosts that haunt our sexual pleasure were born in the Stone Age. Sex and gender taboos were used by tribes to differentiate themselves from one another. These taboos filtered into the lives of Bronze and Iron Age men and women who lived in city-states and empires. For the early Christians, all sex play was turned into sin, instilled with guilt, and punished severely. With the invention of sin came the construction of women as subordinate beings to men.

Despite the birth of romance in the late middle ages, Renaissance churches held inquisitions to seek out and destroy sex sinners, all of whom it saw as heretics. The Age of Reason saw the demise of these

inquisitions. But, it was doctors who would take over the roles of priests and ministers as sex became defined by discourses of crime, degeneracy, and sickness.

The middle of the 20th century saw these medical and religious teachings challenged for the first time as activists, such as Alfred Kinsey and Margaret Sanger, sought to carve out a place for sexual freedom in society. However, strong opposition to their beliefs and the growing exploitation of sex by the media at the close of the century would ultimately shape 21st century sexual ambivalence.

Interspersed with 'personal hauntings' from his own life and the lives of friends and relatives, Knowles reveals how historical discourses of sex continue to haunt us today. This book is a page-turner in simple and plain language about 'how sex got screwed up' for millennia. For Knowles, if we know the history of sex, we can get over it.

This October an FSSS Grant in Aid was awarded to Prof. Abbie Goldberg, of Clark University!



This grant will support her work on a study titled: "Navigating the transition to puberty: Lesbian, gay and heterosexual adoptive parents' experiences."

This study seeks to explore lesbian, gay, and heterosexual adoptive parents' (n = 39) perspectives on the transition to puberty and

adolescence. It will attend to parents' experiences and challenges related to puberty, including how they have navigated discussions about bodily changes and sexuality, the messages they hope to convey, and the resources and supports (e.g., same-gender role models; advice from pediatricians) they have drawn on to support themselves and their children. Findings have implications for scholarship on pubertal and sexual socialization in marginalized families.
