UPDATE FROM YOUR SSSS BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The SSSS Board of Directors and staff are committed to ensuring that our members and meeting attendees feel respected, supported, and welcomed and that all SSSS events and spaces, including virtual/online spaces, are free from harassment, including sexual harassment and assault. In response to feedback from our members and in the spirit of the #metoo movement, the BOD formed an ad hoc taskforce to draft a Statement of Values and Expectations along with a Code of Conduct to be used as a guide when participating in SSSS events. An early draft of these documents was shared at the Annual Meeting in Montreal and the feedback from that Listening

Session was incorporated into a near final draft that was approved by the BOD at the Spring Meeting and has been sent to the organization's attorney for review.

Once the attorney's feedback is incorporated into a final draft and is approved by the BOD, the Statement of Values and Expectations and Code of Conduct will be made available to all members and meeting participants.

Be on the lookout for more information as we get closer to the Annual Meeting in Denver in November!

Hopefully, many of you noticed that SSSS spotlighted a different transgender researcher and their work every day during the week following the

Transgender Day of Visibility this past spring on Facebook (and Twitter). The posts are part of a larger effort by SSSS BOD to create a welcoming, supportive, and affirming environment within our organization by highlighting the diversity of researchers and their work in the field of sexuality research and education. Incidentally, we received a great deal of positive feedback on these posts and they generated the highest traffic that our social media platforms have ever had.




Who are our Members? Results from the 2018 5555 Membership Survey!



Gender Diversity




Length of Membership






Sexual Orientation

IN MEMORIAM: Richard Green

On April 6, 2019, Dr. Richard Green died of cancer in his home in London at the age of 82. Dr. Green was a strong ally of the gay community, publishing controversial (for the time) papers opposing the classification of homosexuality as a mental disorder. He was part of the movement that worked to convince the American Psychiatric Association to drop homosexuality from its diagnostic manual.

Dr. Green was also a trailblazing facilitator of gender confirming surgery, working with Harry Benjamin in the mid 1960s.

In 1975 Dr. Green founded the International Academy of Sex research and became the first editor of the Archives of Sexual Behavior (he would hold his position until 2002!).

Throughout his career Richard advocated for gay and transgender individuals, appearing as an expert witness in more than a dozen trials. In the 90s he took on the Boy Scouts of America by joining a case opposing the barring of openly gay scoutmasters. It's perhaps not surprising that Dr. Green also obtained a law degree from Yale when he was in his 50s, which allowed him to merge his psychiatric work on sex and gender with the law.

UPDATES FROM THE JOURNAL OF SEX RESEARCH

The journal Impact Factor (IF) data was released in June, 2019. The 2 year IF for JSR increased to 3.059 (the 5 yr. IF is 3.544). This is the highest impact factor the journal has achieved and the first time that the IF went above 3!



The journal was ranked 7th (out of 104 journals) in the Social Sciences, Interdisciplinary category and 27th (out of 130) in the Clinical Psychology category.

SSSS NEWSLETTER UPDATE: APA DIVISION 44 CONSENSUAL NON-MONOGAMY TASK FORCE

The CNM Task Force is thrilled to share several exciting updates with SSSS. First, we are pleased to welcome Chrissy Holman, Derrell Cox II, Chris Smith, and Olivia McLeod to our communications team. This team is responsible for branding and amplifying the task force's mission of normalizing and including consensual non-monogamy across the research and mental health sectors.

We are also happy to report that the APA's Committee on Sexual Orientation and Gender Diversity will review our request (https://bit.ly/2PqoK3M) to add searchable categories on the APA Psychologist Locator directory to improve access to therapists who specialize in consensual non-monogamy and kink. In a similar vein, the Task Force has been reaching out to Psychology Today about adding CNM-inclusive search term(s) to their therapist locator directory and are pleased to report that they have since added "Open Relationships Non-Monogamy" and "Sex Positive, Kink Allied" among other inclusive terms to their directory. Providers using Psychology Today are encouraged to update their profiles. While these terms are not searchable yet, we are collaborating with multiple organizations on a campaign requesting that Psychology Today make their new inclusive terms searchable.

Lastly, task force Special Call Campaign Co-Leads Drs. Lisa Dawn Hamilton and Ashley Thompson have teamed up with Carm De Santis to co-edit a special section for the Archives of Sexual Behavior on Consensual Non- Monogamy. Further details can be found here: https://bit.ly/2DujpUh

IN MEMORIAM: JUNE DOBBS BUTTS

On May 13, 2019 June Dobbs Butts, sex researcher and therapist, died in her care facility in Georgia. She was 90.

June was the first African-American to train and practice at the Masters and Johnson institute in St. Louis. She eventually went on to establish her own practice in Maryland, improving Black Americans' access to sex therapy.

Dr. Butts brought the modern and uninhibited view of sex therapy that she had learned in St. Louis to her Black patients. She also brought sex therapy outside of the clinic - appearing on radio call-in shows and writing articles for magazines like Jet and Ebony. June wrote a regular column called Our Sexual Health in Essence in the late 1970s too.

Dr. Butts advocated for frank discussion of topics like masturbation, bisexuality, and gender confirming surgery. Although her ideas were not always warmly received by her patients, family, and the public, she continued her work. She wrote about the need for African Americans to embrace comprehensive sex education and discuss sex with their children, the risks of HIV/AIDS, and the problems caused by the lack of clinical and scientific research on Black American sexuality (an issue that still plagues the field today).

IN MEMORIAM: BRIAN ZAMBONI

Dr. Brain Zamboni died suddenly on March 5th, 2019, at the age of 45.

Brian was a clinical psychologist and was recently a faculty member of the Program in Human Sexuality (PHS) at the University of Minnesota Medical School. He was a Certified Therapist, Educator, and Supervisor of Sex Therapy of the American Association of Sexuality Educators, Counselors and Therapists. He was also a Board Certified Sex Therapist (Diplomate) from the American Board of Sexology.

Brian was a member of the Society for the Scientific Study of Sexuality, during his time with us he served in a number of roles, including Midcontinent Region President in 2008.

Brian supervised many students and trainees and was involved in many sexuality organizations. He will be greatly missed, but his impact and contributions will ensure his memory lives on.

Harrington Park Press, frequent co-sponsors of the SSSS Annual Conference, announces that its scholarly and academic book publications, which cover LGBTQ+ topics exclusively, have been accepted at the publisher level by: Web of Science (Clarivate Analytics) within its Book Citation Index

(https://clarivate.com/essays/selection-process-book-citation-index-web-science/) (primarily the "Science" and "Social Science & Humanities Edition) Scopus from Elsevier, representing the largest abstract and citation database of peer-reviewed literature, including journals, books and conference proceedings. Scopus works with researchers, publishers, bibliometricians, librarians, and academic/institutional leaders to provide an evolving collection of metrics/evaluation tools that supplement qualitative insights.

Both indexes reached backwards to cover the 5-year back-list of Harrington Park Press (https://harringtonparkpress.com/) in its entirety, since 1914. An exclusion factor for both (as well as most) bibliographic services are basic textbooks. These top-tier tools supplement book coverage by selective disciplinary-focused indexes such as PsychINFO (focusing on psychological literature), or Sociological Abstracts which focuses on the social science literature.

"Harrington Park Press takes great care to ensure that its LGBTQ+ publication output is discoverable at both the book and chapter level," according to its Publisher & Editor-in-Chief, Bill Cohen, "And specifically, by indexing services which utilize citation or qualitative vetting criteria.

"Most books and monographs, including ours, are covered by Google Scholar," Mr. Cohen added. "Google Scholar is immensely important because it is free, and therefore by most measures the most widely used. However, its inclusion methodology is primarily robotic. Therefore, Google Scholar may scour for input from self-publishing individuals or entities, as well as so-called "predatory" publishers. Most of those outfits focus on the journal industry, but may also offer, an author-subsidized press for monographs. In the interdisciplinary field of LGBTQ+ studies, this can result in many free resources. Measures or assessment of their quality may range from outstanding to dicey to dubious."

also received one of two Ontario Women's Health Post-Doctoral Fellowships and she is currently working on her post-doc with Dr. Sari van Anders at Queen's.



KLB Research Lab News: Students from KLB Research presented their work at the 80th Annual Convention of the Canadian Psychological Association in Halifax. Jill Northcott from Acadia won the Henry Minton Award for best student oral presentation. Her work applied a novel statistical analysis to the examination of agreement on memories of coming out between LGBTQ individuals and their parents. Odessa McKenna won an award for her presentations on the experiences of same-sex couples sharing affection in public. Breanna O'Handley presented her qualitative analysis of memories of coming out as well as her research on the sexual violence climate survey from St. Francis Xavier University. Steve Wilton gave a talk on the PDA observation study and Dr. Blair and Dr. Hoskin presented their follow-up data on the trans dating study, examining the reasons that people are unwilling to date transgender individuals as well as their research on global collective grief responses to mass shootings, with a focus on the Pulse, Pittsburgh and Christchurch shootings. 
Undergraduate lab member Kayleigh Trenholm received the Scotia Scholar Award from the Nova Scotia Health Research Foundation to spend the summer launching a new study exploring sexual satisfaction and functioning among trans women and Lauren Sobot received the Irving Research Mentorship Award to launch a cross-cultural study comparing predictors of sexual prejudice in Canada, the USA and Turkey.

Lab director, **Dr. Karen Blair**, received the Outstanding Faculty Teaching Award at St. Francis Xavier University at the Spring Convocation and was also selected as one of 25 educators across Canada to participate in the Canadian Society for Yad Vashem's Leaders of Change program which takes educators to Europe to learn techniques for teaching young people about the Holocaust.


Project Update: Developing Clinical Practice Guidelines for Working with Kinky Clients

Last year a team of clinicians and researchers, each who have been working with kink, fetish and BDSM clients for the past 13-30+ years, formed a working group to propose practice guidelines. The working group has taken up the task to review (1) the current state of the empirical literature on kink sexuality and on the state of the professions in addressing this population; (2) the gaps in the empirical literature about BDSM/kink sexuality, where the science is cutting edge; and (3) the clinical issues that confront therapists and counselors when working with kink-involved clients and patients.

The Kink Clinical Practice Guidelines Project is now receiving comments from stakeholders -- clinicians, community members, other professionals -- on a first draft of clinical guidelines. They are meant to articulate goals and standards that professionals can strive for, to guide their own professional development and to increase the quality of services they offer.
